

DECOLONIAL FASHION THINKING & PRACTICE

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Course Description & Objectives:

Despite persistent efforts from various fashion communities—educators, designers, brands, and consumers—to ameliorate the inequities in contemporary fashion systems by incorporating more ethical practices, the industry continues to grow, reinforcing existing unequal structures. Consequently, there have been growing critiques of the 'ethical fashion' approach, as it falls short in addressing the root causes. In this context, decolonial fashion advocates for a more fundamental examination of neoliberal capitalist, Eurocentric fashion values and standards. In *Decolonial Fashion Thinking & Practice*, students will engage in creating counter-narratives and alternative aesthetics to challenge the status quo of Western fashion, confronting the symbolic, cultural, and economic hierarchies it perpetuates globally. The course also includes a series of field trips—paired with the *Fashion Entrepreneurship* course—that offer students valuable opportunities to critically examine contemporary Korean fashion, art, and businesses within the context of colonial and decolonial fashion.
